The Vine and the Branches

15 "I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener. ² He cuts off every branch in me that bears no fruit, while every branch that does bear fruit he prunes^[a] so that it will be even more fruitful. ³ You are already clean because of the word I have spoken to you. ⁴ Remain in me, as I also remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in me.

Seeking and Sustaining Connection...

Shortly, I am going to ask Neville to show you three images and ask you to consider what you think is the common theme that unites them. They are three images from a wonderful photographic exhibition of the work of Steve McCurry, and American photographer, at Seaworks, Williamstown until May 19th.

So, any oral responses on what you think the theme may be? (Pause for suggestions?)

Connection to others, both as individuals, and, as a group, is a core part of what it is, to be human, to be in close relationship, it's one of the things that both Anne and I enjoy looking forward to reading about in the Good Weekend magazine in The Age, entitled, 'Two of Us'._This presents a never- ending variety of grab bites about people of varying ages, sexuality, gender, ethnicity, and occupations; who become friends, partners, and supports to each other in life. A recent article featured an 88-year-old Sicilian Giovanni a widow, and café owner, who has become good friends with a young Italian female chef Lorena aged 37, through her, wanting to source genuine Sicilian cannoli. They have become good friends through their love of cooking.

Connection with others is vital to our well-being and identity, and to us flourishing as people. In our gospel passage today, Jesus chooses to use a metaphor of gardening to convey an image of close connection as Karoline Lewis, a commentator puts it, "That intimate, profound dependence and reliance – because life is nothing without belonging, without intimacy, without relationship." How can we realise our potential if we have no grounding, no sense of origin, no affirmation or possibility outside of ourselves?

For the image, Jesus offers us is found in a section of John's Gospel, called the Farewell Discourses, where Jesus wants to leave his disciples with words of comfort, and hope, in the middle of events that will involve his death on the cross. These farewell words begin at chapter 14, and end at the close of his prayer for the disciples in chapter 17. The words follow the Last Supper of Holy Week and precede his death. In fact, the psalm we read today, begins with Jesus words on the cross, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" This is part of the lament section of the psalm at the beginning – our section was where David praises God for his salvation and saving power.

So, despite these pre-Easter Sunday words, we consider what Jesus said then and to us today who follow him. Jesus stated clearly in verse 5, "I am the vine: you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me, you can do nothing." This is in fact, the last of the 'I am' statements in John, like those that speak of Jesus as the bread of life, the light of the world, the Living water, and of course the resurrection and the life. They are all in essence, mainly revelations of Jesus identity, and His abundant life that He both offers and provides.

The metaphor is one that points to mutuality, connection, union, and sustenance. The branches survive and thrive because they are connected to the vine, Jesus. He is the energy of life, flowing through all things, allowing them to be fruitful. The branches hold the grapes above the ground, free of diseases and allow the flow of nutrients to the grapes. So then how do we both seek and sustain connection to Jesus, so that the fruit that results flourishes and doesn't wither and die?

Jesus makes clear from the start of the passage that the Father is the vine grower, or gardener, who the vine is reliant on. The Father, prunes the vine and branches to ensure the most abundant fruit.

I want to suggest some ways that may help or seek and sustain connection with Jesus. As he indicates in verse 7, by allowing his words to remain in us, is a key way for connection. Through worship, devotional times, and music, we remind ourselves of Jesus words. Of course, when we pray, we bring our requests before him and his Spirit within us reminds us of His words and prays for us. Even though we cannot see Jesus, who is Spirit, like other people, like all good relationships, we need to spend time sharing things with him, and listening for his words, and receiving his love; both as individuals, and in the company of other branches, we are connected to, the Body of Christ, fellow Christians. Later, in chapter 15, he makes it clear that by keeping his commandments we will remain in his love, and also by loving others, we demonstrate that his life is real and vital in us.

So connection to Jesus is vital to seek and sustain, so it is important to notice that Jesus statement is not "you have been, or you will be branches, **but you are the branches** – a promise

for now and an assurance of peace for us all. But what about the fruit, what is the type of fruit that we the branches produce when connected?

I believe that there are some things that are helpful to consider here. Firstly, we are reminded in Galatians chapter 5 that the Holy Spirit is in the business of producing fruit in our lives, Christian virtues, if you like, such as love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self- control. These are wonderful fruit, because they impact others in a good way, and result in random acts of kindness, and a more long-term call to seek the justice and welfare of others. Secondly, we are called to love God and others, as Jesus qualifies in our passage today about love, as **Jesus loved the disciples**.

In fact the third reading set down for today from the first letter of John chapter 4, sheds light on this fruit also. As John says, "We love because God first loved us (by dying for us on the cross), and that our love for God is shown by us loving people both Christian companions and others in the world.

So love, that is real and results in loving actions for others is the characteristic of this fruit produced. Thirdly our passage from the psalm today, speaks about the fruit of our witness to Christ, our actions and words that point to him, when it speaks of, "proclaiming, God's, righteousness, to unborn generations." In others words being a witness to His love and grace.

As one commentator put it, "We need to acknowledge the true love, does not seek the 'quick fix', but is willing to commit to the long-term, seeking true justice, and attempting to be a fruit that lasts."

The vine is the source of our life and energy, as the Reverend Bruce Epperly says, "The branches are not passive. They must nurture and support the fruitfulness of the other branches. There is an intimate interdependence between God and us; while God's existence doesn't depend on our fruitfulness, our bearing fruit, enhances God's, life and mission in the world."

As we welcome, listen to, serve and love others, the impact on their lives can have healing, transforming, and empowering effects, things that make a real difference for their lives. We don't need to do great or dramatic things, as someone said, "We simply need to stay connected to Jesus and love the people God sends across our path, genuinely, humbly and sacrificially." May we all continue to thrive as fruitful branches connected to the abundant life of Jesus.
