

WELCOME AND INTRODUCTION:

Hi! Great to be sharing Worship with you. Ormond UCA is a lively and welcoming faith community. A community which is broader than just those who meet together on Sunday for Worship. This is a community which has stood the test of time and more importantly the tests of caring, loving and faithfulness. We find it such a privilege to belong to this community - connected! Thank you all!

This is the sixth Sunday and the second last Sunday of the Easter Season before the day of Pentecost.

Week by week since Easter Day on 31st March we have unpacked what Easter means for the church and for the disciples of Jesus. I am not going to re-visit that progression today, but I am going to invite you at home to think of a word or short sentence that describes what Easter means for you – particularly what it has meant for you this year during the Easter Season.

As we begin our worship, take some time to think about what Easter means for you and when we come to the proclamation of the Word before you start to read the sermon record your word or sentence on what Easter means for you.

UNISON PRAYER FOR FORGIVENESS

SERMON: Oh, NOT 'LOVE' AGAIN!

(need hand held roving mic.)

Let me share my contribution with you about the meaning of Easter. But let me stress, my answer is no more important or correct than yours. We are sharing our understanding because the reading from the Gospel today lays emphasis for all disciples on what lies at the heart of the Easter event. As a disciple of Jesus, I am (and I quote from the reading), 'no longer a servant or slave but a friend' of Jesus.

Thus, for me, this Easter, as I have led worship and participated in services, sang hymns, prayed, taken communion, shared with others etc, I have become even more strongly convicted on the central meaning of Easter: <u>'I am loved now and evermore!'</u>

Then I hear you saying: 'Oh the preacher is on about love again!' And I reply, 'Yes I am!' And I feel like saying, 'Oh, I'm sorry,' but I am not going to, because the God, the one God, who created the Universe and all that is in and beyond it, who created life, you, me, this wonderful home of Mother Earth, IS PURE LOVE! How can we not be LOVERS! So, if Easter is about anything at all – it is supremely about that love – God's extraordinary love for every single part of his creation, not least, his human children – every last one of them! Every last one of us.

But lest we get too maudlin and oversentimental about this word love, which has, over the centuries, had many popular overuses and misuses, we should note that the Greek word used in our gospel passage today is AGAPE which has nothing, or very little, to do with loving feelings, nor is it a synonym for "like!" <u>AGAPE love is love for another and to act for another, even at cost to oneself.</u> (repeat)

One of my much-loved (there's that word again) authors is Charles Dickens. It is a long time since I read any of his books, but one of them remains a strong favourite of mine: "A Tale of Two Cities." And for a good reason! Let me explain.

'A Tale of Two Cities' is a very complicated love story set in London and Paris during the French Revolution in the 1780 and 90s. Charles Evremonde teaches French in London but has a secret. He is a member of the French aristocracy and fled Paris for London to save his life at the beginning of the French Revolution. And so, for his own safety he changed his name to Charles Darnay. Eventually he meets Lucie Manette, daughter of Dr Manette, and they 'fall in love' and marry. Sydney Carton is a friend of the family, a London barrister, and a derelict reprobate and drunk! But he, too loves Lucie Manette, though he never declares that love for her. He feels unworthy of her love. Lucie doesn't love him in the way she loves Darnay but loves him as a long-standing friend of the family. One astonishing feature of Darnay and Carton is that they are extremely alike in appearance and about the same age. So, all is well until Darnay decides to return to Paris to rescue a friend from the clutches of the French revolutionaries. But he is betrayed, captured, sentenced to die by the guillotine and imprisoned. Now as it happens, Sydney Carton, has contacts in Paris and arranges to take the place of Darnay in his cell – he drugs Darnay and orchestrates a plan for him to be taken back to Lucie in London, while he, the next day, is guillotined as the aristocrat Charles Evremonde by the French revolutionaries. Dickens has Sydney Carton (as Charles Evremonde) engaging in self-reminiscence in a long soliloquy, the night before he is guillotined. He concludes his reminiscence with these famous words:

'It is a far, far better thing that I do, than I have ever done; it is a far, far better rest that I go to than I have ever known.'

Now that is AGAPE. AGAPE love. To love is to be for another and to act for another, even at cost to oneself.

I'll repeat that. Now that is love. AGAPE love. To love is to be for another and to act for another, even at cost to oneself.

The primary norm by which this love for one another is measured is God's love for the world (Jn3:16) and Christ's faithful love for the Father, no matter what! To love is to be for another and to act for another, even at cost to oneself. This is how the divine and human meet – in love poured out for the other – for you and for me!

Easter is love – love freely shared with and for all!

It is THE love story of love stories, from the One who is pure Love: God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

And let me stress this is a love founded in action, not just in feelings – of course, God had and has the deepest of loving feelings for his children and their world.

God is love, but that love was and is expressed in action – love in action, surrendering his own life for the life of the other – we and the created order being 'the other!' Always love - NO MATTER WHAT! Always love - the source of Creation and the source of

re-creation, through his Son – Always love, NO MATTER WHAT!

This is OUR Easter calling – to live in and by that love, and always to <u>act</u> in love, no matter what.

Veronica Lawson, the Roman Catholic Nun and scholar reflects on the understanding of love shared in this passage, in the following way:

'Remaining in the love of God or of Jesus and doing what God or Jesus commands seem to be one and the same thing. In other words, love is not just an emotion: it is always expressed in action that is in tune with and for the sake of the other. The disciples need no further explanation. Jesus' whole life and his courage in the face of impending death have shown them what it means to love one another.

I love that: 'in tune with and for the sake of the other!'

We are Easter people, as individuals and as a community, we live and move and exist because He first loved us, died and rose for us, and commanded us to do likewise. It follows then that we are Easter people who care and who love – always care and always love, for there is no other way to be, as a friend of Jesus! And in fulfilling Christ command to care and to love lies the real joy of living!
